The Italian City-State - Philip Jones 1997-05-22

Italy in the Middle Ages was unique among the countries of Europe in recreating, in a changed environment, the urban civilization of antiquity - the society, culture, and political formations of city-states. This book examines the origins and nature of this phenomenon from the fall of Rome to the eve of its

consummation, the Italian Renaissance. The explanation is sought in Italy's singular 'double existence' between two contrasted worlds - ancient and medieval. The ancient was characterised by the total predominance of the landed aristocracy in economy and society, enforced through a peculiar system of city states embracing town and country. The new medieval influences were marked by the separation of town, country and aristocracy, by the identification of towns with trade and a mercantile bourgeoisie, and by commercial and proto-industrial revolution. Italy shared in both worlds. It remained a land of cities and of an urbanized ruling class (except in the Norman South) and re-established territorial city states; but the states were very different from those of antiquity, the city leaders in the commercial revolution, and Italy itself seen as a nation of shopkeepers, birthplace of capitalism. In this fascinating and ground-breaking study,

Philip Jones traces in detail the tension and interaction between the two traditions, civic and patrician, mercantile and bourgeois, through all phases of Italian life to their culmination in two rival regimes of communes and despots.

Double Heart, Marcel Schwob's
first collection of short stories,

Paris while the author was part
of a "stable" of writers attached
to the newspaper,
commissioned to supply stories
at weekly or fortnightly
intervals. Considered
superficially, the project of
writing a short story once a
fortnight, or even once a week,
does not seem particularly
daunting, but the reality was
that few were able to keep up
such a pace while maintaining
diversity and originality.
During the years when he was
penning the stories assembled

in Coeur double, Schwob was,
however, one of those
aristocrats, and the collection
is remarkably heterogeneous,
both thematically and in terms
of its narrative strategies,
perhaps more so than any
other issued in the nineteenth
century, and its variety offers
an interesting example of
disciplined randomness: not
only a relentless quest for
difference but a relentless
quest for different kinds of
difference. Marcel Schwob was
a genius, albeit one only
appreciated by a limited
cognoscenti, and the present
book, with its idiosyncratic
brand of black comedy, and its
mastery of abbreviation and
understatement, is a long
overdue addition to the work of
this wonderful author available

Energy and Seismic Renovation Strategies for Sustainable Cities - Giuseppe Margani 2019-06-11

The principle of sustainability should be strictly connected with safety, since both aim to conserve resources: in the case of sustainability, the resources are typically thought of as environmental, while in the case of safety, the resources are basically human. In spite of this common ground, discussions on sustainability usually give insufficient attention to safety. In the last years the EU has made large investments to increase the energy efficiency of the existing building stock, paving the way for a low-carbon future; however, less effort has been made to enhance its seismic resilience. Therefore, the safety and, consequently, the sustainability of towns situated in earthquake-prone countries remain inadequate. In such countries, energy renovation actions should be combined with seismic retrofitting. However, a number of barriers considerably limit the real possibility of extensively undertaking combined retrofit actions, especially for multi-

owner housing and high-rise buildings. These barriers are of different kinds: technical (e.g., unfeasibility and/or ineffectiveness of conventional retrofit solutions), financial (e.g., high renovation costs, insufficient incentives/subsidies), organizational (e.g., occupants' disruption and relocation, renovation consensus by condominium ownerships), and cultural/social (insufficient information and skills, lack of adequate policy measures for promoting renovation actions). This book aims to overcome these barriers and to bridge the gap between sustainability and safety, so to conserve both

human and environmental resources.
